The Hill Society recognizes alumni, parents and other friends who support the University through unrestricted annual gifts. Membership starts with an annual gift of \$2,500 to The Fund for Syracuse, our collection of 39 unrestricted current-use funds that



includes the Annual Fund, the General Scholarship Fund, our Dean's Funds and other campuswide program funds.

This annual report exclusively highlights the impact of your unrestricted contributions in the 2019-2020 academic year.

At Syracuse University, we are dedicated to preparing engaged citizens, scholars and leaders for participation in a changing global society. Members of The Hill Society have supported student success by providing unrestricted support that has allowed us to:

- Help our students with unforeseen expenses related to technology access, travel and tuition during the global health crisis.
- > Open the doors to our new hub for student wellness, the Barnes Center at The Arch, which features programs, services and offerings that promote holistic health and well-being in one accessible, centralized space on campus. The Arch staff had 262,422 student contacts in the center's opening semester of Fall 2019.
- Support Our Time Has Come Scholars through gifts to the Black & Hispanic Undergraduate Scholarship Fund. The Our Time Has Come Scholarship Program benefitted 62 Black and Latino students at Syracuse University with an unmet financial need for the 2019-2020 academic year.
- Send School of Architecture students from the Orange chapter of the National Organization of Minority

Architecture Students to the 47th annual National Organization of Minority Architects conference and expo in Brooklyn, New York, where they took first place in this year's student design competition.

- Fund travel to New York City for 60 College of Visual and Performing Arts' School of Design students. As part of the United Nations Collaboration Project, students presented their UN pavilion designs to members of the Department for General Assembly at the United Nations. The students plan to take their work to Dubai in 2021 for the World Expo.
- Prepare students to "imagine the world differently" through study abroad at our six award-winning centers, or at one of our 100 affiliate programs across 60 countries. Study abroad scholarship funding awarded \$119,502, with an average award of \$1,106 per student.

- > Open the National Veterans Resource Center at the Daniel and Gayle D'Aniello Building (NVRC), the first new building from the Campus Framework strategic plan. As a significant example of the University's historic commitment to supporting veterans and their families, the NVRC serves as the central location for veteran life on campus, in the local Central New York community and the region.
- Ensure access to the world-class resources and transformative experiences that nurture intellectual growth. Home of our expansive collections and the Blackstone LaunchPad, Syracuse University Libraries is the hub for research, innovation and collaboration.
- > Over 100 years of post-traditional education! University College has served more than 23,000 students who earned degrees and certifications through part-time and online studies from across our schools and colleges.
- Cover partial costs for student leaders, chaplains and staff from Hendricks Chapel to attend the largest interfaith conference in the world, the Parliament of the World's Religions. Thirteen delegates represented the University's diverse group of religious and spiritual practices.

- Launch innovative programs like the Maxwell X Lab, which partners with local governments and community organizations that need help optimizing their practices. Using principles of behavioral science and randomized controlled trials, the X Lab provides expert consultation at a comparatively modest cost.
- Support 22 Falk College students to travel to Washington, D.C., last fall to meet with employers and alumni. In advance, students attended several preparatory workshops, including an etiquette dinner at the Goldstein Alumni and Faculty Center.
